DECEMBER NEIGHBORHOOD WATCH/PATROL (NWP)

The meeting for Neighborhood Watch/Patrol in December will be the first Wednesday of the month, Dec 1st in the clubhouse at 1PM. The subsequent meetings will be on the second Wednesdays of each month. One of the officers from the sheriff's office is at the meetings which most consistently has been Officer Jim Antila. He gives an update on crime activity active in this area such as break-ins, theft, and vandalism. The crime rate in Forest Park is the lowest of all surrounding communities and this includes several gated communities. He has had communities ask him how to reduce their crime problem and he has told them they need a volunteer group from their own park like Forest Park. Jim emphasizes three things are necessary to continue to keep us safe and secure.

- 1) Every member in the park is responsible to observe unusual or unsafe behavior and if recognized, call the sheriff at 477-1000 and advise them of a potential problem. Do not confront any unusual activity or behavior. THIS IS A <u>NEIGHBORHOOD WATCH COMMITTEE</u>. We are all responsible for keeping each other safe. Houses in the park should have a Neighborhood Watch sign displayed in their window. These signs are available at the NWP meetings.
- 2) NEIGHBORHOOD PATROL consists of volunteers in the park who donate several hours a day, one day a month to drive around the park with a flashing light on their vehicle. This is a visible sign to people outside of Forest Park that there is an organization in Forest Park to keep the park safe. This helps keep crooks out of the Park. The only action that should be taken by a Patrol person is to call the Sheriff's office at 477-1000 for potentially harmful situations and should not become involved with any direct confrontation.
- 3) Lock all your belongings such as houses, sheds, doors, bicycles, carts & cars when not in personal use.

Keep our park safe by displaying a Neighborhood Watch sign in your home window and volunteer to drive once a month for several hours on Neighborhood Patrol with a yellow flashing light on your vehicle. Contact Sandy & Dan O'Brien 910-4329, Ken Warner 567-1728, or Lou Smith 731-1562 to volunteer for Patrol.

WI-FI UPDATE

Several of those attending the FPPOA General Membership meeting on November 18th indicated they had experienced difficulty with the Park Wi-Fi system. The installed system is running and stable and the vast majority of users are experiencing NO PROBLEMS and enjoying great benefits at NO COST. However, we have established a gmail address for residents to identify and record any issues. If your are having problems but can still connect well enough to email, please send an email to this email, Forestparkwifi@gmail.com, recording the nature of the problem and, if applicable, the time it occurred. Doug Ford will be monitoring this email on a regular basis. If your system is not connected well enough to email, please call Doug Ford at 239-731-2028. Please remember the park system is not designed and was never intended to be capable of heavy downloads such as movies etc. It will handle emails, normal surfing, online shopping and travel bookings.

The computer club will help those who would like to connect to the park system. Those close to the transmitting/receiving radios may be able connect to the park Wi-Fi with the built-in antenna on their laptop or with an adapter in their desktop, but the connection will probably be unreliable. The majority of residents will need an external receiving unit with line-of-site to the transmitter. The computer club has found the Ubiquiti NanoStation M2 works well. However, even with this unit, a number of factors may limit the performance of a connection. The age of the computer, the operating system, sites visited, type of downloads and expectations of the operator are all contributing factors. The park computer club is gaining experience in wireless technology and keeping abreast of new developments so we can improve the system over time.

To see if the system will work for you, the computer club has mounted a test unit on a pole and will help you rig a temporary connection to your computer. You can then run on it for a few days. If you find the connection is not meeting your needs, you can stay with your DSL connection. But if you find the park system acceptable, you will know in advance how the permanent installation will perform.

Forest Park has enrolled in Gordon Food Service (GFS) Commercial Savings plan. This is a plan that provides a rebate back to us at the end of the year based upon the amount of purchases made during the year. For instance, if we purchase \$5,250 to \$7,874 during the year, we will receive a check for 3% of the total. GFS provides food in sizes for commercial use. A number of people from our park have used them already.

They may not be the lowest price on every item so they are another alternate to Sam's and Costco and Lawhon's. They offer quite a big selection of items and they can get items from their warehouse in Miami if they are not stocking it in the local store. If you don't see it in the store or on the web site, ask them for information. They will also slice meat to your specifications.
