LABOR DAY

Labor Day pays tribute to the contributions and achievements of American workers, and Labor Day 2018 occurs on Monday, September 3 (it's traditionally observed on the first Monday in September). It was created by the labor movement in the late 19th century and became a federal holiday in 1894. Labor Day also symbolizes the end of summer for many Americans, and is celebrated with parties, parades and athletic events.

Labor Day, an annual celebration of workers and their achievements, originated during one of American labor history's most dismal chapters.

In the late 1800s, at the height of the Industrial Revolution in the United States, the average American worked 12-hour days and seven-day weeks in order to eke out a basic living. Despite restrictions in some states, children as young as 5 or 6 toiled in mills, factories and mines across the country, earning a fraction of their adult counterparts' wages.

People of all ages, particularly the very poor and recent immigrants, often faced extremely unsafe working conditions, with insufficient access to fresh air, sanitary facilities and breaks.

Many of these events turned violent during this period, including the infamous Haymarket Riot of 1886, in which several Chicago policemen and workers were killed. Others gave rise to longstanding traditions: On September 5, 1882, 10,000 workers took unpaid time off to march from City Hall to Union Square in New York City, holding the first Labor Day parade in U.S. history.

The idea of a "workingmen's holiday," celebrated on the first Monday in September, caught on in other industrial centers across the country, and many states passed legislation recognizing it. Congress would not legalize the holiday until 12 years later, when a watershed moment in American labor history brought workers' rights squarely into the public's view. On May 11, 1894, employees of the Pullman Palace Car Company in

Chicago went on strike to protest wage cuts and the firing of union representatives.

On June 26, the American Railroad Union, led by Eugene V. Debs, called for a boycott of all Pullman railway cars, crippling railroad traffic nationwide.

To break the strike, the federal government dispatched troops to Chicago, unleashing a wave of riots that resulted in the deaths of more than a dozen workers.

In the wake of this massive unrest and to repair ties with American workers, Congress passed an act making Labor Day a legal holiday in the District of Columbia and the territories. More than a century later, the true founder of Labor Day has yet to be identified.

Many credits Peter J. McGuire, cofounder of the American Federation of Labor, while others have suggested that Matthew Maguire, a secretary of the Central Labor Union, first proposed the holiday.

Labor Day is still celebrated in cities and towns across the United States with parades, picnics, barbecues, fireworks display and other public gatherings. For many Americans, particularly children and young adults, it represents the end of the summer and the start of the back-to-school season.

JUST A FRIENDLY REMINDER....



There has been some confusion around who is responsible for the maintenance of the ditches and foliage on the perimeter fences.

The perimeter fence was erected by, and is the responsibility of, the Park. Accordingly, the Park will repair or refurbish post foundations, fencing and barbed wire as necessary. It may also trim any growth that threatens to damage the fence.

Please call or come to the office to report unattended over growth on the fence.

The ditches are part of each resident's property and as such need to be included in regular lawncare for each individual home owner. This is very important as long grass or tall weeds are favorite places for unwanted critters, like snakes and iguanas to nest.

We appreciate your cooperation in keeping these ditches maintained as part of your regular lawncare as per

our Rules and Regs. Please remind your yard maintenance person to keep the ditch bank cut when doing your lawn care.

IV. MAINTENANCE OF HOME AND PROPERTY

A. Property owners must keep their lawns, trees, shrubs, flowerbeds and planters neatly trimmed and free of unsightly weeds year-round. Lawns will not be allowed to become unsightly because of uncut grass or weeds. If grass or weeds become 12 inches or higher and is not corrected by the lot owner within thirty (30) calendar days after notification by the FPPOA, then the Board of Directors may have the lawn mowed and charge the owner for such services as deemed reasonable by the Board of Directors. The lot owner hereby agrees to pay for such charges within 30 days.

IMPORTANT RECYCLE REMINDER FROM WASTE PRO

Please do not place any plastic bags in your recycle container. Plastic bags should be placed in your regular trash bins or dropped off at grocery stores which recycle (see below for additional information). Thank you for your cooperation!

PLEASE RECYCLE THE FOLLOWING:

- Aluminum Empty cans and aluminum foil.
- Corrugated cardboard boxes Please flatten, and either cut down or fold to a size of no more than 4' X 4' flattened. Staples and tape do not have to be removed.

- Glass Clear & color food and beverage jars and bottles. Please rinse and remove food and other contents. Labels, rings and lids on glass containers are acceptable.
- Juice cartons All drink boxes and milk/juice cartons.
- Magazines Including catalogs and printed material with glossy pages.
- Mixed paper Brown paper bags, junk mail, envelopes, copier paper, pizza boxes, cardboard egg cartons, paper towel & toilet paper rolls, cereal and shoe boxes.
- Newspapers Includes all paper that is distributed with or as part of general circulation newspapers.
- Plastics With the recycling symbol Recycle #1-2 PET and HDPE containers such as beverage bottles, dishwashing soap bottles, shampoo bottles, plastic milk jugs, and detergent bottles.
- Steel and tin cans Please rinse or remove contents (empty aerosol cans are OK too).
- Telephone books

HELPFUL RECYCLING TIPS

• Please do NOT place any recyclables in plastic bags.

All clean recyclables may be placed together loosely in the same bin or cart.

- Separating newspapers is not required, but newspapers can be placed in brown paper bags (no plastic bags please).
- If your recycle bin is full, put excess recyclables into brown paper bags.
- Plastic bags and Styrofoam containers can be recycled at local grocery stores with designated recycling bins.
- Fluorescent light bulbs can be recycled at a major home improvement store.
- Place yard waste at curb for the scheduled Wednesday pick up only. Please use a cart or can for loose cuttings, avoid using plastic bags. Paper yard waste bags are available at local hardware stores.

DID YOU KNOW?

Plastic Bags are NOT recyclable.

They clog the separating system and are the leading contamination issue that cause loads to end up in the landfill. Please do not put recyclables into plastic bags.

FOREST PARK VISITORS WRISTBANDS

Visitors unaccompanied by Forest Park residents must wear wristbands when using park recreational facilities (pool, mini-golf, etc.). The wristbands are now available in the park office (2 per family and additional bands may be requested). The bands stretch but if they are not large enough you may pin them to clothing, attach them to a key chain or just bring them along.

Please remember that all owners are responsible for their visitors who must comply with all Forest Park Rules & Regulations. Thank you for your anticipated cooperation to assist in maintaining the security of our park.

REMINDER ABOUT HORTICULTURE: Rules and Regs States: Horticulture limbs must be tied securely and not exceed four (4) feet in length and sixteen (16) inches in diameter. Tree limbs are not to exceed four (4) inches in diameter, and not exceed 30 pounds. Please double knot tie strings.

Trash, Horticulture & Waste Disposal Reminder....

Just a refresher on our Rules & Regulations for trash, horticulture and waste disposal...

- Trash bags which weigh more than 30 lbs. will not be picked up.
- Trash bags must be tied, or they will not be picked up.
- Horticulture bags must be tied, or they will not be picked up.
- Loose horticulture clippings must be 4 feet or less, tied & bundled & not more than 30 lbs.
- Cardboard should go out on Wednesdays with recyclables.
- Any outside contractor doing work at your hometree trimming, lawn maintenance, home remodeling/ repairs MUST haul off their own trimming and refuse. It will not be picked up by our maintenance crew.

HAZARDOUS WASTE

Lee County has very strict regulations regarding hazardous material disposal. The Board voted to approve the initiative to have all residents place paint, pesticides, chemicals, florescent bulbs and gas bottles at curbside.

Park employees will pick up these materials on Tuesday and Friday and log them in. These articles will be stored and disposed of in the appropriate manner by staff members.

The rules and regulations have been changed to reflect the process.

GREEN TREE STICKER

There is a little green tree sticker available in the office that goes on the LEFT SIDE OF YOUR BACK WINDOW of your car. All residents with automobiles should have this



highly visible authorization to be in the Park. This will help the safety patrol on their nightly rounds. If you are temporary resident and don't want any stickers on your window, them scotch tape it there while you are here.

RECYCLE BLUE BIN

The blue bin is used for all *other types* of re-cycling such as paper, metal, plastic, etc. This is a separate Program from our regular trash that is picked up on Tuesdays and Fridays. The recycle truck comes on Wednesdays.



Remember to use flashing lights or flashlights when you are riding or walking at night.

GOLF CARD GAME




